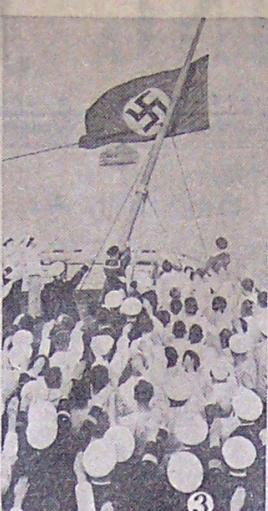
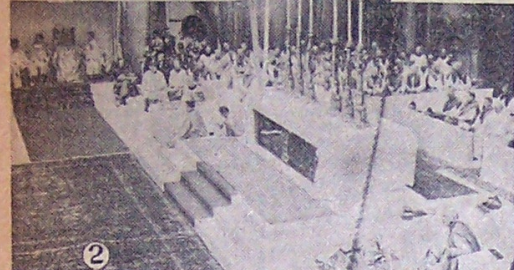
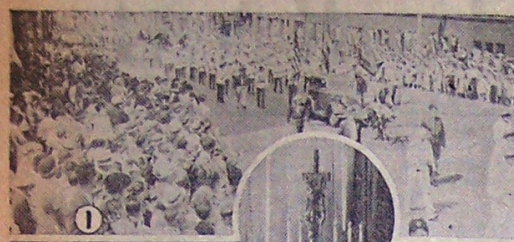


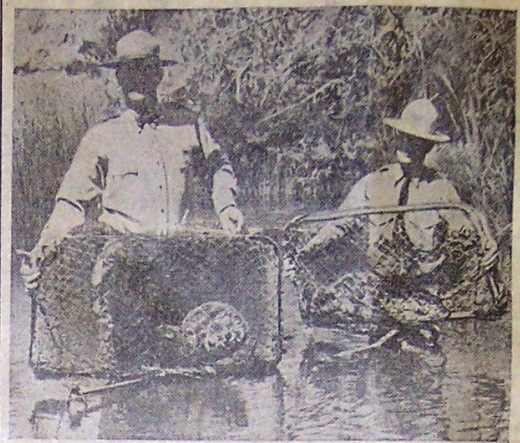

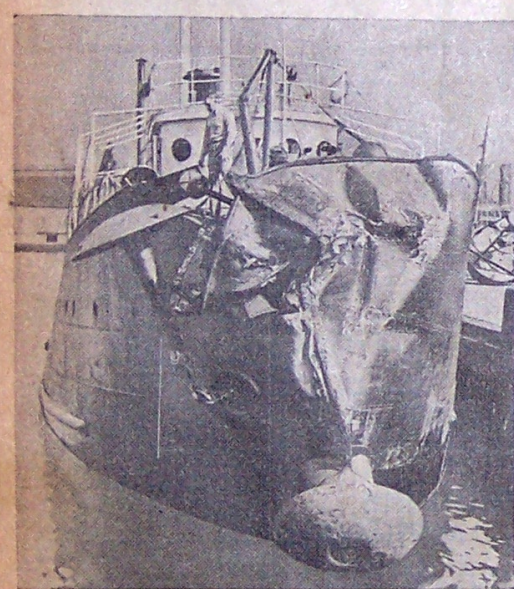

# Five Cowdreys on the Pennsylvania



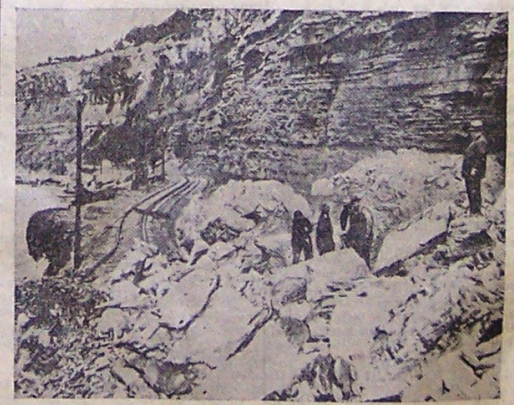

He pointed no accusing finger at any man or man-made system. It was "drink, drink, all the time," said he. Yes, the murderer's name was "Drink," but "False Appetite" invited drink in, and furnished the weapons for the crime.—Christian Science Monitor.

**UNIFORM DRIVING LAWS NEEDED**

One of the greatest barriers to fair and efficient enforcement of traffic laws is the lack of uniformity in the traffic codes of different states and towns.

As one traffic authority recently pointed out, when he drives from one state to another, he doesn't have to stop and change his nickles, dimes and dollars into other and different kinds of money; but, if he wishes to operate his car in accord with the law, he must at once revise his driving habits. He leaves a state where the maximum speed allowed is 40—and then must remember that now he must hold his car down to 30. He has been accustomed to traffic lights and signs placed on corners—now they are overhead in the middle of streets where he is liable to miss seeing them entirely.

Suppose that motor car manufacturers pursued the same practices as many cities and states. Suppose a man who had been driving the Smith car wanted to trade it in for the new Jones model, and discovered that it had a different kind of transmission, required a different kind of fuel, and presented major points of difference in other respects. Such a policy would be no more absurd than is the existing policy of our governmental units in adopting traffic codes that are utterly at variance with those of a town or state 10 miles away.

The Uniform Vehicles Code and Model Municipal Ordinance, prepared by traffic experts, could and should be adopted by every town and city. This would not only give the motorist a break—it would immensely expedite the efficiency of our police and traffic patrol departments, and make an important contribution to the cause of highway safety.

It is the duty of every man, woman or child in the world today to keep constantly in mind the thought and to declare it to others, that God's will is "Peace on Earth, Good will to men."

Where he plants larkspur, he does not look for thistles, but expects to see, in due time, tall spires of shining blue. As he carefully cultivates the seedlings, enriching the soil and keeping it free from weeds, he is expecting to reap a bountiful reward. But how differently we are apt to regard our sowing and reaping in the mental realm! Both the law and the gospel proclaim that whatsoever a man soweth that shall he also reap; but the world, generally speaking, interprets this law as applying to wrongdoing, forgetting that it also applies to the sure and certain reward for right doing.

We read in the book of Job (4:8), "They that plow iniquity, and sow wickedness, reap the same;" and we also read in Proverbs (11:18), "To him that soweth righteousness shall be a sure reward." Why does mankind in general believe in the justice which exacts penalty for wrongdoing, and fail to understand the justice which rewards righteousness? Fear of the penalty attached to wrongdoing does not make a man good; but the joyous recognition of God as infinite good, and the glad acceptance of the fact that obedience to God brings a sure reward, help one to obey God, not because of the reward, but because such obedience brings one nearer to God, the source of all good, and results in an improved sense of health, happiness, and harmony.

The Apostle Paul tells us that "the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, longsuffering, gentleness, goodness, faith, meekness, temperance;" and he adds, "Against such there is no law" (Gal. 5:22, 23). We may sometimes seem to toil laboriously to cultivate "the fruit of the Spirit," but we need to remember that nothing can hinder its growth, and that nothing can withstand its power, for it destroys hate and envy, intolerance, hurry, haste, and waste.

Sometimes a wrong mental attitude of self-depreciation or self-condemnation would hinder us from claiming the divine law of reaping where we have sown.

Self-condemnation would tempt us to think of our mistakes and failures, and to forget the efforts we have made to advance towards good. A false sense of self would blight "the fruit of the Spirit," so that we droop with discouragement, instead of shining with confidence and courage, peace and serenity, which are the sure fruitage of trust in infinite good. If the Apostle Paul had spent his time in condemning himself for his misdirected efforts in persecuting the Christians, he would never have accomplished what he did. He knew that his ministry, in Christ, was far bigger and greater than any personal sense of triumph or failure; and he said (Phil. 3:13, 14), "Forgetting those things which are behind, and reaching forth unto those things which are before, I press toward the mark for the prize of the high calling of God in Christ Jesus."

There is a sure reward for right thinking and acting, but often, through a misunderstanding of the nature of God as divine Principle, the reward is not claimed. We are apt to think of law and justice as relating to penalty, forgetting that divine law is both wise and loving, relating only to good. The teachings of Christian Science reveal God as Principle, undeviating, changeless Principle, Love; and as this idea dawns upon our thought we begin to understand the law which governs right thinking and acting.

In "Miscellaneous Writings" (p. 331) Mary Baker Eddy makes it clear that if we are "abiding in Truth, the warmth and sunlight of prayer and praise and understanding will ripen the fruits of Spirit, and goodness will have its springtime of freedom and greatness." Freedom and greatness belong to goodness; they are the natural results of the activity of good. When we break the bonds of sinful thinking, we must expect freedom, because obedience to divine law brings freedom. We need the "warmth and sunlight of prayer and praise and understanding." As we watch and pray, and give thanks to divine Love for the good which we already possess, and as we endeavor, each day, to gain more understanding of God, the source of all good, we shall understand the divine law of sowing and reaping—and expect it to operate in our experience. . . .
